Active Travel (Wales) Act 2013 Reporting Duties

In accordance with the duties under sections 7 (3) and 10 (2) of the Active Travel (Wales) Act 2013, please find below Pembrokeshire County Council's Annual Report on Active Travel initiatives delivered in 2016/2017

The actions taken to promote active travel journeys

A formal Existing Route Map and Integrated Network Map initial consultation was undertaken for 14 weeks between October 2016 and January 2017. An outline survey was undertaken along with numerous engagement events and partnership working. An additional 12 week consultation was conducted finishing in October 2017 (Welsh Government Active Travel funding)

Kerb Kraft Pedestrian training was provided to 902 pupils (£36K Road Safety Grant)

National Standards Cycle training was delivered to 1167 pupils (£31k Road Safety Grant)

Walk to school events during walk to school week in May 2016 were undertaken with numerous schools. The promotion of cycle to school week, cycle fun days and supported school led cycle rides were carried out throughout the year (Funded by Pembrokeshire County Council)

The Authority developed resources to work with pupils to identify active travel routes. Active journey sessions have been delivered to primary and secondary schools participating in the SUSTRANS' Active Journeys programme. These will contribute to the Stake Holder Engagement process as part of the development of the Integrated Network Maps.(Welsh Government Active Travel Funding, Sustrans funding)

The Authority has worked in partnership with Pembrokeshire College to establish higher walking and cycling levels in staff and pupils and engaged with them as part of the INM consultation. College Freshers were advised about Active Travel and the routes they can use within the Active Travel

settlements.(Welsh Government Active Travel funding)

Press releases prepared to raise awareness of new routes and facilities delivered in 2016/2017 (Pembrokeshire County Council funding)

Ongoing liaison with colleagues from planning, highways and education promoting and providing active travel as part of new developments.

An Active Travel presentation was given to the community planning organisation PLANED raising awareness of the Act in local communities.

Continued partnership with Pembrokeshire Coast National Parks in developing new routes and promoting walking and cycling with the establishment of a seminar for teaching staff regarding the benefits of walking including instruction on safety measures (Pembrokeshire Coast National Parks).

The Pembrokeshire Access Conference held in the County flagged up the work undertaken with the visually impaired on active travel to disabled delegates promoting Active Travel.

Liaison with Sustrans volunteers and cyclists from the local area regarding routes to be included in the "Go Active Travel" in Pembrokeshire leaflet which led to 30,000 being published and distributed throughout the County.

The "Lets Walk Pembrokeshire" programme containing partners in the voluntary sector, National Parks, council departments and health sector looking at innovative schemes to promote walking and cycling.

Crucial crew sessions for 1,400 secondary pupils were held with Active Travel included in the programme.

Walkability projects encouraging people with health issues to exercise more were run in partnership with the Pembrokeshire Coast National Parks (Pembrokeshire Coast National Park £26,500).

Pembrokeshire Coast National Park Coast to Coast publication (Self-funding publication funded by advertising costs). Walks and cycle routes promoted on Pembrokeshire's websites (core funded by Pembrokeshire County Council and Pembrokeshire Coast National Park).

Social media use to promote walking and cycling (Pembrokeshire County Council and Pembrokeshire Coast National Park corporate communication remit).

Adverts in the local press promoting walking and cycling (Pembrokeshire Coast National Park core funding).

Bike mobility cycling initiative for people of various abilities with 813 people taking part.

Advising developers on requirements to ensure that the transport strategy of all development links into the existing footway and shared use path network to ensure multi-use options are available.

Partnership approach with the Police looking to increase walking and cycling in communities through public engagement (Dyfed Powys Police, Active Travel Funding Welsh Government).

Working with schools to highlight existing Active Travel routes and proposed Active Travel routes (Active Travel Funding Welsh Government).
